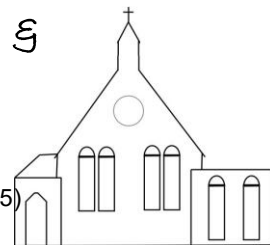

Parish Life and Our Commitments: Parish life is much more than attending Mass on Sundays. It is about being part of a living community, a family of faith, where each of us contributes our time, talents, and prayerful presence. Every member, young and old, has a role to play — whether it is helping at Mass, participating in parish activities, teaching, visiting the sick, or simply praying for one another. "Faith is not something to keep to ourselves; it is a flame meant to be shared." Being part of parish life is also a call to commitment. Commitment does not mean perfection; it means consistency, generosity of heart, and willingness to serve. When we commit to something in the parish — a ministry, a prayer group, a charitable initiative — we are participating in God's work and building His Kingdom here on earth. The commitments we make are not burdens. They are opportunities — opportunities to grow in faith, to witness to Christ's love, and to deepen our relationship with Him. As Mother Teresa beautifully said: "Not all of us can do great things. But we can do small things with great love." Small acts of service, when offered with love, can transform our parish community. A warm greeting to a newcomer, helping to tidy the church, assisting at parish events, or simply offering a prayer for a neighbour — these acts, though small, are powerful expressions of Christ's love. Commitment to parish life also challenges us to place others first. Jesus reminds us that the heart of faith is love: love for God and love for one another. "No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends" (John 15:13). While we may not be called to heroic acts, even small sacrifices of our time and energy show that love is alive in our parish. Moreover, parish life is a journey of mutual support. It is not just about what we give; it is also about what we receive — encouragement, friendship, and the grace of God that flows through a community of believers. Together, we become witnesses to the Gospel, a living sign that God is present in our midst. Let us also remember that no one is indispensable, but everyone is valuable. If we cannot fulfil a ministry, it is important to communicate this so others may step in, and so the parish mission continues smoothly. Commitment is about honesty, responsibility, and a desire to see the parish flourish. Finally, as we reflect on our own participation in parish life, let us ask ourselves: Are we active only when convenient, or do we seek ways to serve out of love and gratitude for God's gifts? "Do not pray for easy lives. Pray to be stronger people" (John F. Kennedy). True commitment sometimes requires effort, but it is in this effort that we grow in faith, hope, and charity. May we all embrace parish life with open hearts, generous spirits, and a willingness to serve. May our faith shine through our actions, and may we inspire one another to live fully as children of God, committed to His Church and His people.
