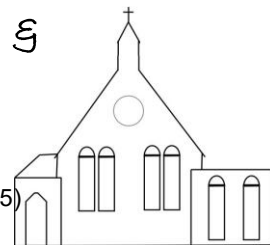

Just a quick and friendly heads-up for everyone. As you may know, the Lloyds Bank branch in Alfreton will be closing on 19th January 2026. We will still be able to pay cash into the parish account at any Post Office. However, Lloyds have recently informed us that from 1st January 2026, cheques will no longer be accepted at the Post Office and can only be paid in at a Lloyds branch, such as Sutton or Chesterfield. Thankfully, we don't receive many cheques, but to avoid extra travel, work, and confusion, we kindly ask hall hirers and donors, where possible, to pay directly into the parish account. Paying by direct debit or bank transfer will really help simplify things for everyone. All the bank details are already available in the newsletter. New Year 2026: Resolutions, Faith, and Parish Commitment: As we begin a new year 2026, many of us make resolutions — to be healthier, kinder, more patient, or more prayerful. These intentions are good, but as Christians and as a parish family, our New Year resolutions can go even deeper. The Church gently reminds us that faith is not lived in isolation, but in community. Before we think about preaching the Gospel outside our parish, we are first called to live the Gospel within it. Jesus Himself said, "By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another" (John 13:35). A loving, welcoming, forgiving parish is the most powerful sermon we can ever give. Late Pope Francis often reminds us that the Church is not a museum for saints, but a hospital for sinners. That means our parish must be a place where people feel accepted, listened to, supported, and encouraged — even when we are imperfect. Creating such a community requires commitment: commitment to prayer, to patience, to volunteering, to forgiveness, and to walking together even when it is not easy. In 2026, let us resolve not just to attend our parish, but to belong to it. Let us speak kindly, avoid gossip, offer solutions rather than complaints, and support one another in times of joy and difficulty. Let us make space for the young, care for the elderly, welcome newcomers, and encourage those whose faith feels fragile. The Gospel grows best in good soil — and that soil is our parish community. When our parish becomes a place of love, unity, service, and joy, the Gospel will naturally shine beyond our walls. May this New Year be a time when each of us asks: What small step can I take to make our parish a more loving community? With God's grace, and by working together, 2026 can be a year of renewed faith, deeper unity, and joyful witness. Let us walk this New Year together — trusting that God, who has begun this good work in us, will bring it to completion.
